

## A LETTER FROM FR. BRIAN

**Dear Ignatians ~**

As we begin June and transition from spring to summer, we are also approaching “herd immunity” and are transitioning from being “Covid-cautious” to being “relatively Covid-free!” We have in effect faced a “15 month Lent,” and now we’re all ready to enjoy a long and healthy “Easter.” And we are also in transition on Sundays.

### Part One

The Church Year is divided into two halves:

The first half is “event” driven. It begins with Advent, leading to Christmas and Epiphany, then Lent and Easter, which leads to the Ascension, immediately followed by Pentecost and Trinity Sundays. During these six months every year we trace the life of Christ, as we his teachings anew and re-commit to become and live as his disciples.

We are now entering the second half of the Church Year. For 25 weeks we will once again follow the Lord through his early public ministry, hear his parables with fresh ears, encounter his miracles with wonder, and find ourselves accepted, cherished, and invited to enter into ever deeper discipleship.

This Season of Pentecost, is by far the longest of our liturgical seasons. Why? Because it’s our “growing season.” It takes time for the Lord to sow the seeds of his Word into our hearts, and it takes time for growth to occur. The Lord will certainly do *his* part, and we are called to be responsive for *our* part.

At the same time, this is when summer’s Sunday attendance becomes somewhat spotty. Invited by a Vestry member to re-consider adopting a summer schedule – combining our 8 and 10 o’clock Eucharists into one 9 o’clock Eucharist – a Sunday morning hand vote in church resulted in 85% wanting to keep the two services year round. This now is your opportunity to follow through on your vote with your attendance.

(Fewer folks are attending via zoom these days, however we will continue with zoom as long as our shut-ins or folks who are quarantined join us.)

And the question once again came up, “What about folks who are gone weekends?” So for the convenience of those who are away occasional weekends during the summer, we will offer an informal Wednesday evening Eucharist at 6pm. So we’re actually increasing our services by one rather than reducing them by one.)

I heard what you told us, and I’m most willing to accommodate your wishes and pray with you when you tell me you can make it. The “ooppss” factor from multiple services is reduced attendance at each – which is often discouraging and uninspiring for those attending. So we will proceed with a “summer schedule” of three services each week.

### **Part Two**

Currently I attend the Lake County Health Department’s and our Diocesan Office’s zoom meetings for clergy:

The Health Dept. encourages us to “continue to protect the least protected by taking precautions for the sake of everyone.” “Since we do not know who is and who isn’t vaccinated,” all are encouraged to continue to wear masks inside church buildings and to keep social distance, “thinking of others.”

The Diocese, as a matter of policy, tells us: “Although the public health situation is changing rapidly, the bishop’s staff and diocesan Covid-19 response team ask congregations to continue following the reopening plan (masks and social distancing) while the state of Illinois is in its bridge phase.”

We’re told to “stay the course” – for now. The difficulty with the temptation to go maskless before we’re given the green light is: We would not know those who are fully or partially vaccinated from those who cannot be vaccinated for medical

reasons or those who never intend to receive a Covid vaccine.

(I’ve heard that the Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago has told the priests in smaller parishes that if 100% of its members register their Covid vaccination information with the parish, they may gather without masks – but who of us wants to go down that road of registering? People are understandably protective of their health information.)

### **And so:**

For now, let’s continue as we are. As soon as I hear otherwise – and since both Health Dept. and Diocesan zooms are on Wednesdays – I will let you know in my weekly Thursday *E-Announcements*.

- So please join us as you are able either on Sundays at 8 or 10am, and we will add a “more casual” 6pm Wednesday’s in-person Eucharist this summer to maintain our connection with those who are gone weekends. (Weather permitting, we can use the church patio for Wednesday Eucharist. You might put a folding chair in your trunk, just in case.)
- Please continue wearing masks and keeping social distance inside our buildings until the Health Dept. and the Diocese direct us otherwise.
- And please accept the Lord’s invitation to grow closer to him during this “summer growing season” as we “hear, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest” his healing and saving Word – and produce a seasonal harvest both to God’s greater honor and glory as well as a bumper crop of service to God’s people.

Blessings for a wonderful summer – we’re a year overdue!
